# **ANNUAL REPORT 2022**

This annual report summarizes the activities of the Local Public Sector Alliance for 2022, which was the Alliance's first official year of operation.

The Local Public Sector Alliance seeks to promote inclusive, equitable societies and sustainable global development by enhancing the understanding of public sector decentralization and localization as complex, cross-cutting and multi-stakeholder reforms.

We do so by elevating the global debate on public sector decentralization and localization, by (1) advancing the state of knowledge on decentralization and localization; (2) ensuring a more informed, interconnected global Community of Practice, where knowledge sharing takes place across countries, disciplines, institutions and sectors; and (3) engaging in convening, outreach and field building to achieve a larger, more empowered global Community of Practice, with country-level champions well-positioned to champion decentralization and localization reforms.

As a global alliance of advocates for inclusive and efficient decentralization and localization, the activities of the Local Public Sector Alliance are largely shaped by the commitment and contributions of its members, who volunteer to share their knowledge and enthusiasm about different aspects of decentralization, local governance, and localized development with others in the global Community of Practice. We are grateful for the contributions and support received from our members, advisory board members, and partner organizations.

# **ANNUAL REPORT 2022**

#### **Program 1. Knowledge Development**

The Local Public Sector Alliance seeks to promote inclusive, equitable societies and sustainable global development by enhancing the understanding of decentralization and localization as complex, crosscutting and multi-stakeholder reforms. In line with this mission, where appropriate, the Local Public Sector Alliance aims to elevate the debate on public sector decentralization and localization, including by engaging in knowledge development activities.

#### P 1.1 - General Knowledge Products

Primer on Decentralization, Multi-Level Governance and Intergovernmental Relations. In April 2022, in partnership with the World Bank, the Alliance published a primer on Decentralization, Multi-Level Governance and Intergovernmental Relations. The main objective of this primer is to establish a common framework for understanding decentralization and multilevel governance and to bring common vocabulary to the topic. The primer provides guidance to enable policy makers and policy analysts to systematically identify the strengths and weaknesses of a country's approach(es) to decentralization, multilevel governance, and intergovernmental relations, and to leverage, whenever possible, a country's intergovernmental systems to improve the effectiveness of the public sector's performance in achieving results.

<u>Local Governance Institutions Comparative Assessment (LoGICA) Framework.</u> The revised Local Governance Institutions Comparative Assessment (LoGICA) Framework was finalized in September 2022 based on extensive feedback from the Community of Practice. This tool provides a diagnostic tool to analyze the multilevel governance structure of a country, along with the subnational institutions and intergovernmental systems that contribute to inclusive governance, effective public service delivery and sustainable localized development.

#### P 1.2 - Specific Knowledge Development

State of Local Governance Institutions in Africa and Asia. With the support of partner institutions in Africa and Asia, the Alliance has begun gathering data for LoGICA profiles for a select number of countries in the two regions, with the aim of preparing regional State of Local Governance Institutions (SOLGI) assessments in Africa and Asia. Mr. Nick Travis was contracted to support the LPSA Secretariat in managing the global rollout of the LoGICA framework.

The countries included in the first round of LoGICA assessments in Africa are Ethiopia, Malawi, South Africa, Tanzania, Uganda, and Zambia. The regional SolGI effort in Africa will be guided by the nascent LPSA Sub-Saharan Africa Expert Working Group and backstopped by the LPSA

Secretariat. Support is being solicited from UNCDF in support of this first round of LoGICA assessments.

At the same time, Bangladesh, East Timor, India, Indonesia, and Nepal are included as part of the first set of LoGICA profiles to be included in the SoLGI assessment in Asia. This effort is being guided by the LPSA Asia Expert Working Group and supported by an NYU Capstone Research Team. The work is being undertaken in close partnership with number organizations, including the Asian Development Bank, The Asia Foundation, Oxford Policy Management, Forum of Federations, the World Bank, UNDP, UNCDF, and others.

### **Program 2. Knowledge Sharing**


#### P 2.1 - Decentralization.Net

The Alliance's online platform, Decentralization.Net (DNet), is the global convening place for policy makers and researchers interested in decentralization and localization. The platform served over 56,000 pageviews during 35,000 web sessions to almost 27,000 users around the world. Website visits reflected an 80% increase vis-à-vis 2021).

#### P 2.2 - Newsletter

The Alliance's main form of communication with the larger Community of Practice is through the LPSA Connections newsletter. The LPSA Team sent 6 newsletters to the full Community of Practice audience (sent bi-monthly starting January 2022) and 6 Special Announcements (in the offmonths).

Over the past year, the Alliance has increased its newsletter audience by 479 new members / subscribers (1,068 total members/ subscribers to the newsletter).

In addition to webinars hosted by the LPSA Team, in November 2022, by invitation from UNDP/Moldova and the Government of Moldova, LPSA co-hosted a webinar on territorial-administrative reforms in Moldova, opened by Prime Minister Natalia Gavriliţa.

#### P 2.4 - Online courses

The online mini-course "Decentralization: Why and What?" – which was prepared in partnership with The Hague Academy of Local Governance – launched on September 8, 2022. So far, 106 participants have registered for the self-guided online course.

#### Program 3. Convening, outreach, and field-building

#### P 3.1 - Global /general outreach

In 2022, LPSA concluded partnerships with The Hague Academy of Local Governance, Forum of Federations, and the DeLOG Development Partner Network. The Alliance also met and discussed a partnership opportunity with UNCDF in December, with the aim of establishing a partnership arrangement with them in early 2023.

#### P 3.2 - Research and academic outreach

The Alliance presented Outstanding Paper Awards to young scholars for outstanding research on decentralization and local governance in Asia, Africa, LAC and ECA Regions during 2021 and 2022. In addition to the regional awards, LPSA will also present the Global Outstanding Paper Award in early 2023.

#### P 3.3 - Expert Working Groups

LPSA Expert Working Groups consist of groups of practitioners and scholars who bring together skills and expertise in a specific sub-topic or cross-cutting issue within the field of decentralization and localization. Each working group seeks to assess, advance, and share the state of global knowledge within their topic area, with the objective of providing the global community with best-practice conceptual and operational knowledge to address development challenges on that particular topic.

The Alliance is currently in the process of forming a number of Expert Working Groups for key global regions as well as in key areas of interest to the Community of Practice. In order to plan events and advance the general state of knowledge on decentralization and localization, each working group aims to meet at least once every quarter.

In 2022, the Alliance tentatively established the regional LPSA Expert Working Groups (EWG) in Asia, Europe and Central Asia (ECA), and Sub-Saharan Africa (SSA):

- The LPSA EWG in Asia will be led in partnership with ADB, The Asia Foundation, and Oxford Policy Management. This EWG is jointly co-chaired by Madhavi Rajadhyaksha (OPM India); Rachana Shrestha (ADB); and Peter Yates (The Asia Foundation).
- The LPSA EWG in the ECA Region will be led in partnership with NALAS. This EWG is jointly co-chaired a number of leading decentralization and local governance experts in the region, including Adrian Ionescu, Jelena Janevska, Gábor Péteri, and Glendal Wright.
- In its initial stages, the LPSA EWG in the SSA Region is coordinated by LPSA Director, Astrid Haas, a leading decentralization and local governance expert from the region.

#### Program 0. Inclusive governance of the Alliance

#### P 0.1 - Board of Directors and Officers

The Local Public Sector Alliance was established and incorporated as non-for-profit corporation in the Commonwealth of Virginia in January 2022 with Jamie Boex, Charles Cadwell and Paul Smoke as its founding directors. The Board appointed Jamie Boex as the Alliance's Executive Director. LPSA received its designation as a not-for-profit 501(c)3 entity from the Internal Revenue Service in March 2022. Upon adopting its bylaws, the Board of Directors move to expand the board to five directors and recruiting Astrid Haas and Rose Vincent as directors to ensure a globally inclusive, highly expert, and active Board of Directors.

#### P 0.2 - Advisory Board

The LPSA Advisory Board was formally established by LPSA's Board of Directors as part of the Board initial meeting on February 4, 2022, as a mechanism for receiving regular input from the global community of practice on decentralization and localization. The Board of Directors appointed Serdar Yilmaz as Chairperson of LPSA Advisory Board. The Advisory Board meets on a quarterly basis and has quickly grown to become a globally inclusive, highly expert, and active Advisory Board (with 20 members in addition to the chair), ensuring regular feedback from the global community of practice on the Alliance's programs and activities.

#### P 0.3 - Core administration

In July 2022, Ms. Mirna Dave was contracted by the Alliance as the LPSA Program Manager. Together with the Executive Director, Ms. Dave manages all aspects of LPSA's administration and operation. Among others, during its first year of operation, the Local Public Sector Alliance developed LPSA's Strategic Plan 2022-2026, and adopted LPSA's corporate Mission, Vision, Principles and Policies. Based on feedback from the Advisory Board and Open Community meetings, the Alliance prepared its Annual Workplan 2022/23. All corporate documents and disclosures are available on LPSA's website at:
